

# Q1. Do you feel art has the power to transform societies / individuals?



## **Comments:**

I think that the context makes the art and the artist something relevant, in a negative or positive way.

Art has always served as a political tool for marginalised communities; to speak to power, to fight and to resist oppression. This art for sure transforms the communities and individuals and enacts real change, but it is not always given credit. I do not think that art from dominant and elite levels of society have the power to transform society, as they are too invested in the status quo to really radically shift paradigms. The art in question then, as a direct product of the artist, may or may not have this transformative power depending on how the artist aligns themselves. Often dominant society does not want to acknowledge transformative art because they do not benefit from it, so it also depends on which aspect of society we are talking about.

Art can build a foundation that may have the power to transform, the artist in a plural would have a chance to to transform, a society that isn't oppressed and has a voice can transform, the individual who listens and cares can transform.

Transformation or change has to be structural and certain art can, potentially, only make visible certain social/political issues but has no real structural power to transform anything.

I think art has an influence on the large society, if and when it is not elitist.

Art that is accessible and parts of cultures have, in history, transformed societies and individuals. I am constantly being transformed through art.

I think there needs to be a openness to topics in general. If people are too comfortable in their position they might never want to transform.

Art is the fabric of every society/individual - it is constantly influencing us without our awareness from utilitarian products to multi-media design

It gives us the means to express thoughts and feelings which are more conceptual than the world around us!

Art can be a powerful tool which systems of power will try to hijack and exploit to keep the status quo to just as much as artist can use as transformational. Also artists work between the lines and sometimes with abstraction and poetically, which risksthe clarity of intention getting lost and changed to suit the needs of other agents


It can give food for thought and cause aha moments, more impactful than eg written word

I think it depends on many things. I think art can provide transformative experiences for individuals and then depending on the context those individuals may reflect/ behave/ change in a way that has a knock on effect on the communities or societies around them. I don't think it os often as direct as transformation as people like to think. And many stuctural barriers can get in the way of individuals transformating themselveses or their actions in result to art that have experienced.

In Palestine for instance the art during the 1970-s 1990 was basically addressing political issues. Struggle against occupation, freedom, rootedness to the land. It was labeled as "committed art". and the grassroot communities related well to the imagery and symbols used.

Dominant art does not want to change society but to have it as it is.

The people who's in charge of these institutions are mainly white males

because the people who hold the power, and also own such institutions, have no interest in changing society nor the place they hold as being in the dominant position.



## If they have their damn priorities straight!


They can raise awareness and bring about change - but only if they have the freedom to work outside the given norms

I suppose they are because they have to reinvent themselves, largely because they have been criticised because of appropriation, narrow mindedness and not being able to think outside of the European perspective


Woke-conomics;)



because of linguistics and semantics, the word itself its cliché and people either relate it to and elite world or to trash and laziness.


Yes, because it's less classist and more accessable

## i'm still figuring it out


I see art and creating as an experience that never stand by itself and is an ongoing process, that provides growth and questioning
